direction was forthcoming. Mission Australia officers visited the DEG in November to discuss their plans for a new mental health support program for Walgett. Mental health is a huge issue in Walgett and DEG welcomes new services to meet this need.

DEG works to improve Walgett services



In November DEG learnt about a new federal program which promised to facilitate youth employment and training in our region. The DEG's youth plan of 2004 saw the need for a locally-based employment and training facilitator who would match local youth with businesses and training opportunities in a systematic way. Staff and elders present believed they demonstrated little understanding of our recommended approach.

In February 2005, the Dharriwaa Elders Group made an expression of interest to the owners of the derelict Walgett community hall, Murdi Paaki Regional Housing Corporation, for ownership. Soon afterwards, the board of the MPRHC voted to give the hall to the Dharriwaa Elders Group. DEG then produced a business plan and lobbied

NSW DAA to commission a scope of works. Because of a caveat put on the title of the building by the federal government, Dept of Family and Community Services and Indigenous Affairs has to approve the disposal of this valuable asset. They finally met us about this in March 2007.



In April representatives of the Dharriwaa Elders Group met for the second time with officers of Dept of Family and Community Services and Indigenous Affairs, to discuss the future of the Community Hall in Walgett's main street. The FACSIA project officers said at the above meeting that federal funds could not be used to fix the building unless ownership and /or management by the whole community could be demonstrated. They had heard that factions in the community had apparently opposed



DEG ownership of the building. The assumption that DEG will not make the hall available to the "whole community" offended, and DEG advised that their proposal for multi-organizational management was not practical. FACSIA convened a meeting with service providers in May which DEG could not attend where the Land Council proposed to manage the building. The DEG did not learn about this meeting's discussions until the notes were made available to the DEG in August 2007.



DEG archaeological survey

In May DEG worked with consulting archaeologist Lori Sciusco from Heritage Concepts. Lori was engaged by NSW Dept of Mineral Resources to report on cultural heritage in the OPA 4 area for its first Review of Environmental Factors 2004. We met her then, and so added to her work in our area by engaging her to produce a plan for protecting Aboriginal cultural heritage in the OPA 4 region. An important part of the plan is documenting what is on the ground - which hasn't been done by anyone system-

atically yet. We have found that evidence is needed to persuade governments to implement state and federal laws to protect areas of Aboriginal cultural significance in our region. Richard Lake accompanied Lori to rural properties in the Walgett district including Kia-Ora, Terewah, Kigwigil and Llanillo. They were greatly encouraged by the enthusiastic support of all landholders contacted. Thanks to Heritage Concepts for their financial contribution towards this important project.



Unfortunately the pits were being filled in as work had ceased and would not begin again until late in 2007. Judith Field, Archaeologist from The University of Sydney promised to notify both organizations before the next dig takes place.





Intervention required at sacred site near Angledool

NSW Dept of Natural Resources staff and a community member informed DEG in October of clearing undertaken at the sacred Yuwaalaraay creation story site Gawurragiil Spring near Angledool. DEG checked that NSW Dept of Environment and Conservation (DEC), administrator of

the NSW National Parks and Wildlife Act which protects Aboriginal sites, was aware of the problem. Since then DEC reported to the DEG that the sites have been fenced within a large buffer zone and are now protected by the landowner.



Movement re AP Nomination

In 2002 the Dharriwaa Elders Group nominated Dungalear and Narran Lakes to be gazetted under the NSW National Parks and Wildlife Act as "Aboriginal Places". We have been advised that gazettal will protect against mining and other threats. DEG archaeological survey



In April the DEG conducted a second archeology training survey so that three local Aboriginal men who had already voluntarily attended some Aboriginal site identification training for the DEG last year. The aim is to provide the Aboriginal community with the skills to conduct surveys for the DEG resources permitting. Archeologists Heritage Concepts offered to provide the training exercise so they could



train their staff as well. In this way, the DEG could also undertake some surveys of private lands within the area known as OPA 4, which are threatened by opal mining. We aim to enter as many sites as possible into the NSW Dept of Environment and Climate Change's database, so that they can be better protected under NSW laws (if they are enforced).

Landholders meet

The Dharriwaa Elders Group called a meeting with land-holders in the Opal Prospecting Area 4 in December to feedback results from our archaeological survey on their properties, and to discuss issues of common concern. We believe valuable information was exchanged and appreciated the opportunity to work to protect Aboriginal cultural heritage in the region. Movement re AP Nomination

In 2002 the Dharriwaa Elders Group nominated Dungalear and Narran Lakes to be gazetted under the NSW National Parks and Wildlife Act as "Aboriginal Places". We have been advised that gazettal will protect against mining and other threats. After letters were written by DEG's legal advisors regarding protecting places of significance in OPA 4 from mining, the NSW Dept of Environment and Conservation acted. This year we heard that announcements were immanent.



Heroic Italian ranger visits

Cristina Rovelli, a wildlife ranger from northern Italy, visited Walgett with her family in May. Dharriwaa Elders Group members George Rose, Ted Thorne, Richard Lake and Lewis Beale took the party of travellers to the Narran Lake Nature Reserve so they could visit our internationally significant wetland and learn how important it is to the local Aboriginal community. DEG friend Frances Pike from the Border Rivers CMA organized the visit and provided translation.

Cuddie Springs dig continues



September 9th DEG elders Neville and Lewis Beale along with Ted Thorne and Project Officer Richard Lake attended another Sydney University open day at Cuddie Springs. About sixty people turned up for the event with the archaeologists.



September 19th Walgett's Kids Excel Class along with their teacher Deb Walford and Principal Jonathon Harvey were taken by Dharriwaa Elder Neville Beale and Project Officer Richard Lake to archaeology digs at Cuddie Springs. Judith Fields the archaeologist in charge remarked that this was only the second group of school children to visit the dig since it began about fifteen years ago.

NAAC representation

The Namoi Catchment Aboriginal Advisory Committee which includes Richard Lake - a delegate from the Dharriwaa Elders Group, met at Breeza Station in February. They learnt about nearby pasture regeneration projects, and discussed issues like the impending changes to the NSW National Parks and Wildlife Act.. The DEG looks forward to learning of outcomes from the Namoi and Western CMA Aboriginal Advisory Committees in the future.

Council forced to consult



DEG responded to a Council meeting agenda by making a written submission to the open forum of Council's November meeting. DEG's advice was ignored, in particular in relation to the spelling of the word "Gamilaraay" on a proposed road sign. Neither the Gamilaraay or Yuwaalaraay languages have a "k" sound, and to ignore this fact is insulting, especially when the local elders group provides a correction. A DEG member was so incensed that the Aboriginal community would have to put up with a road sign welcoming visitors to Walgett in "Kamilaroi" country that she made representation to Kevin Humphries (our local MP) and the Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commission. Once prompted by these authorities, the Acting General Manager, Emma Darcy quickly resolved the situation by consulting with the DEG in December. Progress!

Foundation Hall update
