DEG's work to recover trust funds





She met with the local LACACC - Local Area Command Aboriginal Consultative Committee, to pass on information about the implementation of the new NSW Police Aboriginal Strategic Plan, in November. Local and Regional Plans will be developed by the local and regional Aboriginal Consultative Committees, and will be implemented by Police, Attorney General's and other NSW Govt departments. After attending this important meeting the DEG staff realized that participation in this Plan could provide the opportunity needed to improve the services of NSW Police for Aboriginal people in Walgett.



LACACC meets

Under the new NSW Police Strategic Directions policy, Local Area Commands Aboriginal Consultative Committees meet to develop local action plans. They report to Regional meetings ("RACACC") which reports to the state-wide meetings ("PASACC"). Outcomes identified in the plans must be met by police, and there are opportunities for other NSW agencies to be involved at the state level when issues demand a more holistic approach. The DEG supports and works for a local implementation of the Policy and George Rose is seen at right welcoming community members from other towns in the Command to the Walgett meeting held in May.
