Speaker's Annual Report to Dharriwaa Elders Group ("DEG") members for 1 July 2023 – 30 June 2024.

#### **Members News**

In January 2024 the Elders Council lost long term Elders Councillor Violet Morgan. In March 2024 the Elders Council lost its long-term Speaker Clem Dodd. Both Elders are fondly remembered and honoured for their contributions to the organisation.

From 1 July 2023 – December 2023 the following Elders Councillors presided: Speaker: Clem Dodd, Secretary: Virginia Robinson, Treasurer: Rick Townsend, Elders Councillor: Violet Morgan. They were joined by Elders Councillor Elizabeth Peters from 2 August 2023 – 29 September 2023.

During the period DEG's Elders Council had 10 meetings.

The AGM of the Company was postponed from 19 December 2023 and 8 March 2024 due to Covid 19 and Sorry Business until it was held 26 April 2024. During that time Full Members were approached and asked to consider joining the Elders Council.

At the 26 April 2024 AGM the following were elected: Secretary: Virginia Robinson, Treasurer: Ricky Townsend. Elders Councillors: Elizabeth Peters.

A selection of Full Members were approached and then formally invited to fill Elders Council casual vacancies and Sandra Suey Thorne and Elizabeth Williams joined the Elders Council in the meeting of 31 May 2024. At the same meeting Sandra Suey-Thorne was elected Speaker.

The DEG contributed food vouchers for 22 x Walgett funerals during the period and mourned the loss of these people, loved of the community.

#### Representation

Narran Lakes Co-Management Committee. The Dharriwaa Elders Group had no delegate to this committee during the period.

**NSW Aboriginal Cultural Heritage and Arts Association "ACHAA".** Clem Dodd represented DEG as a director of ACHAA attending meetings by video from Walgett. Clem attended the ACHAA gathering at Boomali in Sydney in November 2023 with Rick Townsend, Wendy Spencer, Barry Simpson and Zoe Sands. After Clem's passing, Rick Townsend was elected to represent DEG on the ACHAA Board, and attended the ACHAA gathering in May 2024 at Murrook Aboriginal Cultural Centre with Barry Simpson and Zoe Sands.

**Lightning Ridge Area Opal Reserve Manager.** Wendy Spencer is the gazetted ex-officio representative of the DEG for this committee. The other members of this committee represent opal mining, opal tourism, opal retail, the Lightning Ridge LALC and Lightning Ridge heritage interests and

concerns. During the period management activities were conducted to reduce risk and enable the public to enjoy the reserve. The need for surveys of the Reserve's environmental and ACH assets in order to better manage them is often raised by DEG, as is the long-term aim for the Reserve to provide access to Country for Aboriginal communities of Walgett and Lightning Ridge. During this reporting period DEG made a proposal for the management of Gugurraan Lake so that its high environmental and Aboriginal Cultural Values can be restored.

#### **General Manager's Report**

The Objects of Dharriwaa Elders Group continued to be implemented. Increased investment into Yuwaya Ngarrali allowed DEG's staff and activities to expand this year in order to better respond to our community's needs. DEG is continuing to learn how to operate in self-determined ways and holistically - showing government agencies how to support Aboriginal Community-Controlled Organisations like DEG.

DEG is proud that its employment of local Aboriginal people continued to grow in the period. This growth was accompanied by more administrative work, alongside human resources and staffing challenges. In particular, we work to fill executive support and management capability gaps and to obtain staff housing that we have designed with our Yuwaya Ngarrali partners.

DEG continues to support its members to manage local Indigenous Cultural Intellectual Property – a responsibility championed by Founding Members and cultural custodians now passed. DEG networks with similar Aboriginal cultural organisations in its NSW peak body family ACHAA to grow in this undervalued domain. ACHAA is a member of the Coalition of Aboriginal Peak Organisations of NSW and works with other ACCOs to Close the Gap.

The Department of Health's CHSP program supported the provision of Elders Social Support and associated Transport activities. The DEG is actively advocating that its model of holistic social support for the aged is recognised and resourced appropriately. The National Indigenous Australians Agency extended the successful Walgett River Ranger Program until 30 June 2026.

DEG's work this year also included advocating for more supportive and responsive government agency roles and approaches, particularly in response to the high number of Walgett's children and young people interacting with police and the criminal justice system, food and water security crises, housing shortages and water management. The voice of DEG grew its influence, one of the outcomes we choose to measure by our Yuwaya Ngarrali (YN) evaluation processes – see Evaluation and Learning Report 2020 – 2023: <a href="https://dharriwaaeldersgroup.org.au/images/downloads/Yuwaya%20Ngarra-li%202020-2023%20learning%20and%20evaluation%20report%20June24.pdf">https://dharriwaaeldersgroup.org.au/images/downloads/Yuwaya%20Ngarra-li%202020-2023%20learning%20and%20evaluation%20report%20June24.pdf</a>.

Notable research projects DEG proposed and undertook with YN partners include understanding government procurement of Walgett services, analysing publicly available data re Walgett, designing appropriate supportive housing for Elders, children and young people and for emergencies, and collaborating with Walgett AMS and Aboriginal Legal Service NSW/ACT to establish a new wellbeing service for children and young people. Our YN Food and Water for Life Program with Walgett Aboriginal Medical Service implemented supermarket food choices promotions and supported a growing Walgett Gardeners Network. During the period it designed a Community Freezer program to distribute frozen free meals.

Yuwaya Ngarra-li "vision"



Yuwaya Ngarra-li (YN) is a community-led partnership between the Dharriwaa Elders Group (DEG) and the University of NSW.

Associate Professor Ruth McCausland, is the Academic Lead of Yuwaya Ngarra-li. The core Yuwaya Ngarra-li ("YN") team is based in Walgett and UNSW Sydney.

The purpose of Yuwaya Ngarra-li is for the Dharriwaa Elders Group and UNSW to work in partnership to improve the wellbeing, social, built and physical environment and life pathways of Aboriginal people in Walgett through collaborating with government, philanthropy and community organisations on evidence-based initiatives, research and capacity building, and to evaluate this model of CommUNIty-Led Development as a way of working with other Aboriginal communities.

The DEG has identified the following long-term aims for Yuwaya Ngarra-li in Walgett:

- 1. Greater Aboriginal community control and capacity
- 2. Increased numbers of Aboriginal young people in education, training & employment
- 3. Reduced numbers of Aboriginal people in contact with the criminal justice system
- 4. Improved social determinants of health and wellbeing amongst Aboriginal people
- 5. Improved sustainability of energy, water, land and natural resource management
- 6. Redirection of government funding towards strengths-based, holistic, community-led and sustainable initiatives


The partnership is developing and testing a new model of 'CommUNIty-Led Development' which is a place-based approach to breaking the cycle of systemic disadvantage, centring the needs and priorities of Aboriginal people through the leadership of a respected local community-controlled organisation and drawing on the expertise, influence and resources of UNSW.

Our work with the Yuwaya Ngarra- li partnership during the period was grouped over these areas: Aboriginal Community Leadership and Control, Youth Justice, Water and Country, Research and





Evaluation, Dealing with Fines, Housing.



With our Yuwaya Ngarrali partners we published in February 2024 a paper that explains our learnings from developing and operating the Bulaaarr Bagay Warruwi Burranbaligu (Two River Pathway to Change youth service) 2018 – 2013. Yuwaya Ngarra-li Briefing Paper: Lessons from the Two River Pathway to Change Diversion Model 2018–2023 (https://www.unsw.edu.au/content/dam/pdfs/research/2023-10-yssy-burton-clark/2024-02-yn\_tworiversbriefingpaper.pdf).

The Youth Wellbeing Service that we are building for Walgett in Collaboration with the Walgett Aboriginal Medical Service Ltd ("WAMS") and Aboriginal Legal Service (NSW/ACT) Limited ("ALS") is based in Aboriginal SEWB models, which are holistic and position people within their broader social, historical and political context. Children and young people in Walgett are inseparable from, and embedded within, family, Community, Country and Culture, and the Two River Pathway model three-interlinked strategies recognises this.

The Two River Pathway to Change model is a locally-led model informed by the evidence including that by UNSW researchers involved in the Yuwaya Ngarra-li partnership.

#### Youth Justice

Since 2018, the DEG through its Yuwaya Ngarra-li partnership with UNSW has developed the <u>Youth Diversion</u> <u>Demonstration Model Bulaarr Bagay Warruwi Burranba-li-gu</u> (Gamilaraay) ('Two River Pathway to Change') model, which has three interlinked strategies:

- 1. Influence practices and services and improve accountability of responsible agencies to support better outcomes for Aboriginal children and young people ("CYP")
- 2. Support engagement and leadership by ACCOs, parents/carers to support better outcomes for Aboriginal CYP
- 3. Work intensively with Aboriginal CYP in Walgett to increase their rates of belonging, safety and wellbeing and reduce or prevent ongoing contact with the criminal justice system.

To better operate this model we evaluated DEG's work in this field and reached out to Walgett Aboriginal Medical Service Limited and the Aboriginal Legal Service NSW/ACT Limited to establish the Walgett Wellbeing Collaboration and to start work on designing and implementing a Wellbeing service for children and young people.



## Policy and advocacy

The direct relief Dharriwaa Elders Group provides for community members experiencing hardship is made possible from our on-line fundraising appeals, and an annual grant of \$10,000 from the Paul Ramsay Foundation. DEG knows that our community's hardships usually have systemic causes, and so our collection of evidence and advocacy efforts are important for influencing and changing government priorities. While direct relief to individuals is important, systemic change is required for long-term building of community and individual wellbeing.

During the period we built Dharriwaa Elders Group's Dealing with Fines program, with the help of Yuwaya Ngarrali coach Peta MacGillivray.

Vital partners were the Aboriginal Legal Service NSW/ACT who collaborated with Dharriwaa Elders Group to provide a fines legal service which DEG team supported clients to benefit from. This achieved many fines write-offs. Legal Aid NSW also assisted DEG with its interactions with Revenue NSW by providing DEG staff with training and other supports in the maintenance of DEG's Work Development Order status. DEG's close relationship with WAMS also benefits this program because participation in an AOD or mental health care plan is a good way to reduce fine debt. #### Housing

Throughout the period, our Yuwaya Ngarrali collaborator, architect Samantha Rich, worked on different projects for DEG, and visited regularly (seen at left in February 2024). In particular she developed the plans for a cluster of Elders units for a funding submission made to Dept Health and Ageing in January 2024. Unfortunately our submission was not successful, however DEG is determined to eventually build the housing designed from Samantha's workshops with Elders. Other work during the period included supporting students to develop a brief for the Walgett High School to enhance their Wellbeing Room, scoping properties for DEG's Youth Wellbeing Service, and planning and making a submission for 2 x DEG staff houses. #### DEG aims to eventually see services welldesigned to meet the needs of the Walgett Aboriginal community delivered well by placebased Aboriginal Community-Controlled Organisations. To bring this aspiration to reality we work to support our organisations' capabilities. We did this during the period by developing training resources, bringing in management, planning, coaching and psychosocial supports, and by working with sister organisations in ACHAA to build the resources and capabilities of the sector. We also work to improve the ways governments procure services and work with us – including by looking at how govts invest in Walgett and proving new service models that actually work.

The 2020-2023 Yuwaya Ngarra-li Evaluation and Learning Report was published in June 2024. (https://www.unsw.edu.au/content/dam/pdfs/research/2024-02-yn/2024-06-yuwaya-ngarra-lievaluation-report-2020-2023.pdf).

The report summarises the outcomes and lessons from the community-led partnership, including the Two River Pathway to Change model's focus on reducing Aboriginal children and young people's contact with the criminal justice system. The evaluation identified 101 outcomes the TRP contributed, including a significant decrease to 7.8% of Walgett Aboriginal CYP appearing in the local Children's Court, and direct assistance to 144 Aboriginal community members around criminal justice-related matters, including intensive support of 17 young people.
